ATHERINE MORAVEC, AN EMERGENCY MEDICINE DOCTOR AT ECU HEALTH BEAUFORT HOSPITAL IN WASHINGTON, NC, AND HER HUS-BAND, WARREN ALLEN, NOT ONLY SHARE A LIFE BUT ALSO JOINTLY OWN AND MANAGE TWO ESTABLISHMENTS IN THE HISTORIC DOWNTOWN – 1906 BISTRO AND BOURBON, AND THE WEST MAIN. ADDITIONALLY, WARREN WEARS THE HAT OF CO-OWNER AT ELITE TRUCK, A COMPREHENSIVE WORK VEHICLE EQUIPMENT PROVIDER COVERING EVERYTHING FROM LARGE FLEET DEALS TO SINGLE CUSTOM ORDERS. WARREN HAS BEEN NAMED THE 2024 YOUNG PROFESSIONAL OF THE YEAR.

Why did you choose your profession?

W: I chose marketing and startups because of the opportunity for growth, the learning and the challenge it provided. There is an incredible amount of work that goes into it but ultimately there is a lot of flexibility that comes with it. I was fascinated early on by growth in e-commerce and technology companies and that continues today with our growth and investment at Elite Truck.

K: I loved math and chemistry in high school so the obvious major for me in college I thought was Chemical Engineering, but as I progressed in college, I changed directions and went Pre-Med. Still completing my Chemical Engineering degree and then going to medical school afterwards. I realized Emergency Medicine is in a great position to help people who are in a vulnerable situation.

Who in Beaufort County has influenced your life the most?

W: Our progress with our building renovations and business openings has been most influenced by Jonathan Russell, the Washington City Manager, and members from the city such as utilities and the fire department. Everyone has been helpful with getting the required permits and inspections, working with us to keep the ball rolling.

K: There are a lot of moving parts with any project and we have received a lot of support from the city to smooth out the obstacles.

W: Jonathan has been a call away for anything big or small – be it the dumpsters needing to be emptied more frequently or electric services turned on. Anytime we have had complications or needed clarity in the process, he has helped us navigate the projects and getting them done.

K: I would add my biggest Beaufort County influence, since I do spend a lot of time at work, has been Emilie Pendley. She is from Beaufort County and is a local physician who is largely invested in the community, from the EMS aspect to being at the hospital, giving countless hours to help our county and those to the east. She's been a good female career role model.

It's a beautiful day in Beaufort County and you have the day off. How are you spending it?

K: We would get up in the morning and walk our dog to a coffee shop, saying hello to our neighbors along the way. Then we'd pack up and pick up the boat from Inner Banks Marina to get out on the river for a few hours. We'd ride the boat over to Backwater Jacks for lunch and enjoy a few more hours on the river. Then clean up before heading downtown to one of our favorite spots. If it's a Friday night, we are going to the wine tasting at Wine and Words.

W: Or dinner at The Hackney. It sounds like a perfect day.

K: There are so many good options! We don't get tired of our favorite spots.

If you were to plan Beaufort County's future and it was to come true, what would you like to see happen?

K: I would love to see more festivals in the streets and concerts in the park – things that really bring the community together!

W: I would love to see increased collaboration across restaurants, charities, and organizations to produce the events Katherine mentioned for the entire community. More forward thinking from the stakeholders in Washington, realizing that there may be exponential growth that needs to be accounted for, or growth will be limited based on the actions taken.

Why should people consider working, living and playing in Beaufort County?

W: I believe the pace of life is something that more people are starting to consider. Here in Beaufort County you can enjoy walking to get coffee in the morning. You have restaurants and bars all within a few blocks. I think that there are still opportunities to move here and grow in the community because it is not oversaturated. It is a great town especially for young people and families to consider.

K: I think the water access is amazing with multiple public ramps. Living in Indianapolis before I came to North Carolina, I've experienced full size cities, but here there really is a neighborly feel. You make friends fairly quickly around here and we've really enjoyed it.

WHY SHOULD PEOPLE CONSIDER WORKING. LIVING, AND PLAYING IN BEAUFORT COUNTY?

JUST FOR FUN: WHY ARE PEOPLE SO OBSESSED WITH TAYLOR SWIFT AND TRAVIS KELCE? I think it's more Jason and Travis Kelce, and then Taylor Swift. Jason is more like the "dudes dude" – a football guy. Travis has more flare and theatrics, getting excited on game day. You get both types of guys there. On the flip side of that, Taylor Swift, the fantastic global super star. I can still remember listening to T-Swift in 9th grade. She brings a whole new crowd to football. You mix that crowd with the Kelce crowd, I don't know the Venn diagram, but I don't too many people who would fall outside of it. The people outside of it probably wouldn't have watched football anyways, but I would say it brought a lot of people to football and I love that. It has been interesting to see the timeline of the season. At the beginning it was, "We have a Taylor spotting!" up in the booth and now it's just expected. It's a really cool thing for football and I am pumped for T-Swift.

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE YOUR PROFESSION?

I grew up with a younger sister, so I was always very protective of her. I am a protective person and I look out for those I care for. In my role as an Assistant District Attorney, I care for the public. I have the opportunity to be the voice for those who don't have a voice and to protect those who aren't able to protect themselves. WHO IN BEAUFORT COUNTY HAS INFLUENCED YOUR LIFE THE MOST?

I'd say it's two people – Tom Anglim and Seth Edwards. I felt like I was in school until the 25th grade. I felt like I started being an adult at 25, and not only as a baby lawyer, but also as a baby adult; it was the first time I was not in a school setting. Both of them, through their help here at the office, mentored me in the field of law, making me become a better attorney. Also, the lessons that they have taught me filled in as that mentor figure going into the abyss of the adult world. I hit the jackpot with Tom and Seth. They are two of the most incredible men that I have ever met – respectful, respected, and damn good at what they do, serving the citizens of Beaufort County.

WHAT WAS YOUR INITIAL IMPRESSION OF BEAUFORT COUNTY AND HAS IT CHANGED? IF SO, HOW?

I grew up in a small town so coming here, I traded the mountains for the water. First impression was it's a cute town on the water with a mix of country life. Downtown feels like a Hallmark movie walking down the streets.

AMRY SADLER WAS NAMED BELHAVEN'S NEWEST TOWN CLERK IN SEPTEMBER. SHE IS A PINETOWN NATIVE AND ALUMNA OF EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY. SHE IS A FORMER SAFETY COORDINATOR FOR FACILITY SERVICES AT ECU HEALTH BEAUFORT HOSPITAL. HER DAY-TO-DAY INCLUDES MAINTAIN-ING IMPORTANT TOWN COUNCIL DOCUMENTS, WORKING WITH TOWN MANAGER LYNN DAVIS AND TOWN COUNCIL MEMBERS, MANAGING THE TOWN WEBSITE AND CEMETERIES.

AS SOMEONE WHO WORKS IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT, HOW WOULD YOU ENCOURAGE MORE YOUNG PEOPLE TO GET INVOLVED AND BE MORE CIVIC-MINDED?

I did not come from any local government, and I am still learning. I think do your research. I did not research. I did not follow along with any politics, government, anything like that. But just having the knowledge or a basic understanding of it - there's a lot to learn about your community.

AFTER DOING YOUR RESEARCH AND NOW WORKING IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT, HAS YOUR OPINION OF BELHAVEN CHANGED? IF SO, HOW?

Yes, and no. Belhaven is still this cute little tiny town, but there is a lot of politics that you don't see growing up - that you don't really hear about until you are here. Working for a government agency - you learn that a lot of people are very political here. They are going to hold people that work here to a higher standard. They're also going to let you know about every little thing that's happening in this town and what needs to be fixed.

DO YOU FEEL, IN GENERAL, THAT POLITICIANS AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT LEADERS LISTEN TO YOUNG VOICES?

I do, here. I don't have experience anywhere else, but I do here. Our mayor, our manager and even our council - I feel like they do listen, and I think they actually kind of reach out towards the younger generation. They know I look at things differently than they look at things so a lot of times they do ask my opinion on some things or how to handle some things or what we can do in Belhaven for toddlers, because I have a toddler. I think they value younger generations.

WHAT WOULD ENTICE A YOUNG PERSON TO COME TO BEAUFORT COUNTY?

I think it's the river. We spend a lot of days, summer days especially, even fall out on the river, on the boat, beach areas. I think that is an attraction to Beaufort County for younger people.

WHAT ARE SOME UNIQUE CHALLENGES YOUR GENERATION FACES VERSUS OLDER GENERATIONS?

I think your home and work life balance. I'm a mom of four so it is a struggle - my home life and trying to work a full-time job, not just a job but a career. Right now, I'm getting ready to start my clerk's school at UNC's School of Government, and I'm going to be gone four weeks out of the year. Well, my kids are going to be here and they still have school and cheer and wrestling and all that going on. I think trying to find the balance of chasing a career and still being a mom.

I felt like I saw a need, and started it as a sole proprietorship. I felt like I saw a need in town, because there is a population of people who want something different.

IF SOMEONE VISITED BEAUFORT COUNTY FOR THE FIRST TIME, WHERE WOULD YOU TAKE THEM?

I would probably take them for coffee, because I feel like I can't do anything without doing that first...Probably Goose Creek State Park. I really like to go there...I really have a love for the Estuarium. I think it's neat. I would definitely take them along the riverfront, because there is a lot of beauty in that.

WHY SHOULD PEOPLE CONSIDER LIVING, WORKING, PLAYING IN BEAUFORT COUNTY?

I think it is growing and has a lot of potential. It has room to grow without becoming Greenville. I think that the good part is that there is a downtown that is solid and concrete and established and has history. As a business owner, I try to think of things that people are looking for so they don't have to drive out of town.

WHAT ARE UNIQUE CHALLENGES THAT YOUNGER GENERATIONS FACE THAT OLDER GENERATIONS HAVE NOT OR DID NOT?

As a business owner, appropriately managing social media alone is like a part-time job. I've gotten myself into a habit of posting in the morning so it's done regardless of what it is. Usually, if I don't have something to make first thing in the morning I will have saved a picture of something from the day before and use that for first thing in the morning. Social media is tough, you have to be really careful about what you're putting out there and just staying on top of it so you keep people engaged and how you engage them is different for different age groups. In this area, you're trying to reach two totally different audiences...Social media is definitely a thing that it never was before, and now it's turned into straight up marketing.

WHAT WAS YOUR INITIAL IMPRESSION OF BEAUFORT COUNTY AND HAS IT CHANGED?

It hasn't changed. I feel like the county is split down the middle. You have people that are wealthy and then you have people who are nearly poverty stricken...I'm sure there is middle ground in there. There's people that fall in between, but they probably even look super wealthy compared to some of the poverty that is here...I think because Washington is a water community it's going to draw in people from other places to move here especially for retirement, but again it's that money that keeps it going as well. I'm not trying to paint it in a negative or evil light, because that is revenue for the town and growth and encouragement.



HARLOTTE STUBBS, AN EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY ALUMNA, IS THE EVENT AND VENUE MANAGER AT THE WASHINGTON CIVIC CENTER. HER DAILY RESPONSIBILITIES INCLUDE CONVERSING WITH CLIENTS TO MAKE SURE THEY HAVE EVERYTHING THEY NEED, HELPING EVENT PLANNERS WITH DESIGN AND WORKING WITH STAFF TO PRESERVE THE CHARM AND CHARACTER OF THE 118-YEAR-OLD BUILDING THAT WAS FIRST A TRAIN DEPOT.



JUST FOR FUN: WHAT IS YOUR COFFEE ORDER? I make my own at home. I have an espresso machine so I make a latte every day. Whether hot or iced, typically it is a plain vanilla latte. Sometimes I'll put a little cinnamon on it, or if I'm on a caramel kick, I'll do a caramel drizzle.

WHY SHOULD PEOPLE CONSIDER WORKING, LIVING, PLAYING IN BEAUFORT COUNTY?

HIS JOB RESPONSIBILITIES INCLUDE ADMINISTRATION, NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT LIKE PRESCRIBED TREE REMOV-AL, SPRAYING INVASIVE SPECIES, PLANNING EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS, FIRST RESPONSE AND LAW ENFORCEMENT.

WHAT WAS YOUR INITIAL IMPRESSION OF BEAUFORT COUNTY, AND HAS IT CHANGED?

I think initially when I first came out here, I thought it was a really small county with not many people and very rural. It still is and that's how I generally think about it, but I really do enjoy working here. My ideas and impressions of Beaufort County have gotten better. It's a great place to be. I'm from Greenville. I'm from Pitt County. I grew up there as well, and I live there now so I kind of had a standard. Beaufort County is smaller than Pitt County, population wise, but I love it. 

WHAT THINGS ABOUT WASHINGTON REMIND YOU OF GROWING UP IN COLUMBIA, S.C.?

WHEN WAS THE LAST TIME YOU OVERCAME ONE OF YOUR FEARS AND HOW DID YOU DO IT?

"The first thing that comes to mind would be wakeboarding, when you are trying to land a new aerial trick while being towed by a boat while standing on a wakeboard. It isn't an easy sport to begin with. And on my level, you are always trying to master the next trick. And what comes with that is some pretty hard falls and the potential of hurting yourself. There are some young folks who don't see the need to vote because they are conflicted by the words of some of those who are running. I say, "exercise your right to vote, as we worked hard to get it." Time is one thing we can't get back. If we value the community in which we live, we have to take the time.


LELAND GALT AGE: 34
